

"You get that horse to really operate as if he's your legs, and you can take that anywhere you want. You can dress up in any kind of clothes you like. You can be a jumper, dressage rider, trail rider, cowboy, anything."

Arena and Club Grounds

Please remember to keep all our Club gates closed, all the time. Even the most accomplished handlers have been known to lose control of an equine partner – and what a potential disaster it would be for one of our four-legged friends to go charging off the Club grounds into the busy street. (It has happened.) Signs are posted on the main entry gate as well as on arena and round corral gates. Please respect this important rule for everyone's safety.

Reminder: NHI Club Use Rules

- The club is open to members only, and for the purpose of riding and/or exercising your horses.
- Masks are required to be worn if you are closer than six feet from anyone who is not a member of your household. In other words, persons who are outdoors and maintaining a distance of at least six feet from others are not required to wear a mask. However, such persons must have a face covering with them at all times and must put it on if they are within six feet of others who are not from their household.
- No other form of socializing on club grounds is allowed at this time.
- Main Arena: No more than 6 riders at a time, maintaining social distance.
- Turnouts now allowed if no riders are waiting to ride.
- Warm-Up Arena: No more than 2 riders at a time, maintaining social distance.
- Round Pen: No more than 1 rider at a time. Turnouts allowed.
- Riders are allowed to ride for one hour in the arenas.
- Please keep track of your time and be respectful if others are waiting to ride.
- Riders may use the club for up to 2 hours (split between arenas) but must exit the club grounds after 2 hours. This will reduce the possibility of "gatherings."
- Trails are open! You may haul to the club grounds to park and then ride out from NHI via along the road. Do not use the old access trails behind the clubhouse.


And another big thank-you to Lauren Magner, for her ongoing work pulling weeds and cleaning up the club grounds! Your efforts are deeply appreciated!
